While we are waiting for the members to get to their desks the Chair would like to introduce some guests of Senator Marsh, some 25 pre-school students from Lollipop School. They are up here in the North balcony with Miss Melissa Marsh, Miss Valerie Fisher, Miss Vicki Helmick and Miss Lynn Swanson. Would they wave to us up there. Good morning to all of you. Welcome to the Legislature. We have ten absent and we still have a few more to come in here. Let's see, who has not...Senator Clark, do you want to give us a green...? Senator Wagner, would you give us a light? That's it I think. They are all here. Call ins? Senator Reutzel said he will accept call ins.

CLERK: Senator Labeledz voting aye, Senator Barrett voting aye, Senator Rumery voting no, Senator Vickers voting no, Senator Haberman voting no, Senator Hefner voting no.

SENATOR REUTZEL: Oh, let's have a roll call.

PRESIDENT: Let's just have a roll call vote and get it over with. Proceed with the roll call, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read roll call vote found on page 975 of the Legislative Journal.) 19 ayes, 19 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance.

PRESIDENT: The motion fails. The bill does not advance. We will pass over...according to the Speaker and the introducers have agreed that LB 891 we will pass over today. We will go on to LB 440. Mr. Clerk, LB 440.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 440 was introduced by Senator Peter Hoagland. (Read title.) It was first read on January 17 of last year. It was referred to the Banking Committee. It was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by Senator DeCamp's Banking Committee.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Mr. President, in order to move rather fairly rapidly on a major bill I would simply tell you the committee amendments combine two major bills into one and become the bill itself and I would suggest, so that we can actually discuss that matter, we adopt the committee amendment and then Senator Hoagland can explain his bill. Just by way of preliminary information, the final result is a composite bill that resulted from a very intensive
