States and other countries. Such treaties are now in effect between the United States and several other countries, however, each state has to designate a person to consent to such transfers. LB 808 provides that the Governor may authorize the Director of Correctional Services to consent to such transfers. I move the advancement of LB 808 to E & R initial.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Senator Reutzel. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. 808 is advanced to E & R for review. 889 has a special order for next week. 910 has a kill motion on it so we go to 592. Yes, Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: Are you passing over 910?

SPEAKER MARVEL: 910 has a kill motion on it.

SENATOR NEWELL: Can't we take kill motions up on...?

SPEAKER MARVEL: No, not according to the...we can put the bill back on General File for Monday. See, these bills are on the consent calendar because they qualify under the provisions as stated in the various categories. The category that we are dealing with now, the following bills were advanced to General File with no dissenting votes, with no committee amendments. This bill now does not qualify. So whoever put the kill motion on has effectively stopped consideration of this bill at this time but if there is a request we can put 910 on the regular General File for the first of the week.

SENATOR NEWELL: That would be fine. I was thinking, I don't think it would take a long time to kill it. Whatever the Speaker wants to do.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Those are the rules and so it pertains to you and me and everybody else. 592.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 592 was introduced by the Appropriations Committee. (Read title.) The bill was read on April 6 of last year, referred to Appropriations. It was advanced to General File. There are no amendments.
