LB 592, 885

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move that LB 592 be advanced. 592 is an old statute that by law required that the residence, food, fuel and lights be provided for the warden and deputy warden at the Nebraska Penal Complex and the committee feels that there is no point in having that mandated by statute. That was put in at a time when the residence itself was on the grounds. It was presumed to be as a requirement. The residence is no longer there. It does not exist on the grounds and in any event it ought to be an appropriation matter that the Legislature can adjust from year to year as it sees fit with the circumstances involved. We do provide housing in a variety of places around the state where it is appropriate and necessary and none of the others are required by statute and there is no need or reason to provide this one by statute and, in fact, the residence isn't even there so we would move that the bill be advanced.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the advancement of 592 to E & R for review. All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. Senator Warner, while we are waiting for 835 do you want to take up 885 now? We are voting on the advancement of 592. Have you all voted? The motion before the House is the advancement of LB 592 to E & R for review. Pat, record the vote.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. The bill is advanced. Senator Warner, do you want to take up LB 885 now?

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 885 was introduced by the Appropriations Committee. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 23. It was referred to Appropriations, advanced to General File. There are no amendments pending, Mr. President.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, I move that LB 885 be advanced to E & R initial. This is a part of the restoration of the State Capitol to help return it to the condition as well as providing the furniture to be returned that was placed in the capitol when it was originally built. It requires the DAS, which they have done over the years in any event, but provides the identification and classification of the original capitol furniture, to develop an inventory of that and provide for the return
