LB 649, 785

SENATOR MARSH: For it's advancement. LB 649 is before the body for advancement to Enrollment and Review. All those in favor signify by voting aye, opposed nay. Senator Marsh voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Marsh voting aye.

SENATOR MARSH: Have you all voted? The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Madam Chair.

SENATOR MARSH: The bill is advanced. We are now ready for LB 785.

CLERK: Madam Chair, LB 785 was introduced by Senator Warner. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 16, referred to Public Works. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by Senator Kremer's Public Works Committee.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Madam Chairman, members, the bill itself has to do with the towing of a...I think in all cases, of a sand truck, trucks hauling sand and it has to do with the length of the tongue on a pup that follows the sand truck. The Attorney General brought us some amendments that he felt were needed to make this bill workable. Now I am not prepared to go through the amendments. They are quite lengthy but all I can say is at the Attorney General's suggestion that these amendments be adopted to make the bill workable and that is all I can say at this point. If Senator Warner would like to add something to it he is certainly welcome to take my time and do it, on my speaking to the amendments, Madam Chairman.

SENATOR MARSH: Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the two committee amendments or the committee amendments, I understand have two parts. One, as Senator Kremer indicated was a result of a Attorney General's opinion referring to a law that was passed back in 1931 dealing with trailers that are pulled, the kind that you see...I can't think what you call them, Senator Kremer, the ones that have the long tongues on them and anyway that Attorney General's opinion from that old law, the way they are made nowadays, was in conflict with what was legal and so it just clarifies, repeals that old law to reflect, in fact, what everyone has
