

going to make it one-seventh of them and you are going to save two million. Do you mean to tell me that by license fees we generate in the vicinity...

SENATOR CLARK: Well, no what they have to do, Senator....

SENATOR KEYES: Wait a minute....we generate in the vicinity of 14 million dollars. That is what you are telling me. With a license fee of fifty cents or sixty, whatever it is, we generate about 14 million. I think somewhere along the line, like DeCamp, that we had better hold this over and get some of the things straight, because you are saving too much money.

SENATOR CLARK: You can hold it over as far as I am concerned. It doesn't make any difference to me. If it is that complicated to you I would hold it over. But the state is completely responsible for the making of the license plates and they get nothing back from it. That has gone out to the counties. You know how the money is distributed.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I support the Clark motion. As you recall last year, we had a bill that we supported in this Legislature and extended the life of the license plates one year from 5 to 6 years. That saved us a great deal of money by delaying it that year. Now we are again asking to delay an additional year to make it a seven year period, and again savings would result as a result of this amendment if we would adopt it. I don't think we need to wait on this matter, although if there is confusion perhaps that would be in the best interest. But I do think it is a measure that we ought to support and ought to enact because it would be a tax savings. I know Senator Warner will be speaking to the Appropriations Committee's activities in this area. I know in Public Works Committee we have been concerned about this question. We had a bill dealing with the change in license plate systems that would have helped in the transition period from going from the present plates to the new plates and that bill was killed in committee and as Senator Clark mentioned there may be some problems in that transition as a result of not looking at the new system which was proposed in that legislative bill which was killed. And so I think giving us an extra year to work out any problems and to foresee this transition would be in the best interests of the state and
