The physician assistant would not be employed, would not be working at ringside without the specific permission of and acceptance of responsibility by a physician. PRESIDENT: Senator Fitzgerald. All right, Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, who is carrying this bill? Miscellaneous Subjects Committee. Senator Newell, I have some real questions on what we are doing with young boxers under this bill and I am going to raise them on the floor because when we heard this bill in the Appropriations Committee as one of my major concerns, it seems to me that we have nor in the past have had no control at all over fifteen, fourteen, thirteen, twelve year old youngsters that fight through these boxing clubs and I am concerned about that. I want to know if there is anything in this bill that addresses that category of youngsters now, and if not so, why not? This really concerns me. Now I am not opposed to boxing. I am not opposed to these youngsters participating in these sports but sometimes I have some real questions as to the supervision they have and the sponsorship of these junior boxing matches and I don't even know the proper terminology of it. Is there anything in this bill, is there any steps, any protections, any safeguards for this category of fighters? Now, Senator Newell, can you answer that question or direct me to the appropriate person?

SENATOR NEWELL: That is what I am going to do, the latter, direct you to Senator Fitzgerald who is the Chairman of the subcommittee that dealt with this. Fitzgerald, Powers or Murphy can answer those questions.

SENATOR FITZGERALD: (Mike off) brought this up at the committee and nothing in the bill, starts at sixteen and over. The Silver gloves take care of all the youngsters sixteen and under. It is a national organization.
