CLERK: Record vote read. (See page 1192, Legislative Journal.) 42 ayes, 0 nays, 5 excused and not voting, 2 present and not voting, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The bill is declared passed on Final Reading. The Clerk will read on Final Reading finally LB 801.

CLERK: (Read LB 801 on Final Reading.)

SPEAKER MARVEL: All provisions of law having been complied with, the question is, shall the bill pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. Record the vote.

CLERK: Record vote read. (See page 1193, Legislative Journal.) 39 ayes, 1 nay, 6 excused and not voting, 3 present and not voting, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The bill is declared passed with the emergency clause attached. It is my pleasure to introduce Tom Vickers predecessor, a warhorse from Holbrook, Nebraska, named Richard Lewis. Will you stand so we can say good morning to you. Coming into the North balcony from Senator Koch's District are 46 fourth grade students from Loveland and Arbor Schools, Omaha, Nebraska with teachers, Mrs. Cyndie Perry and Mrs. Rose Valentino and seven parents and aides, in the North balcony. CLERK: Mr. President, LB 889, title read. The bill was first read on January 23 of this year. It was referred to the Ag and Environment Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, LB 889 was introduced at the request of both the fertilizer industry and the fertilizer dealers in the state and also the State Department of Agriculture. It redefines fertilizer. It clarifies the registration procedures for inspection purposes. The inspection law was first passed in 1975 and it is felt by some members of the industry and also by the Department of Agriculture that there need be these revisions in the fertilizer law.
