SENATOR CHAMBERS: But isn't your bill designed to... you said give them the tools to do their job. Are you saying then that this bill will not give one officer ability to do what one officer cannot do now?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what connection did Colonel Kohmetscher's example have then? If the problem was that one officer could not disperse a large crowd, wasn't the problem one of manpower rather than defects in the law? Thank you, I don't have any more to ask.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp. Senator DeCamp, is he within the chamber? He is in the phone booth. Somebody find out if Senator DeCamp wants to speak. The question has been called for. Is that what I heard him say? All right. Do I see five hands? I do. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on ceasing debate? Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate on the motion to advance.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. Debate ceases and, Senator Haberman, do you have any closing on the motion to advance?

SENATOR HABERMAN: No closures.

PRESIDENT: All right, the question then is the advance of LB 605 to E & R for engrossment. All those in... Do you want a board vote on this? All right, I thought somebody would ask for it. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Clear the board. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Well we might have to ask for a Call of the House to get that extra vote. Anybody who has not voted... Well we can't wait forever.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Call of the House, Mr. ... well, here he comes.

PRESIDENT: We will let Senator Hoagland get in here and vote and see how he votes. All right, the motion is shall the House go under Call. All those in favor of a Call of the House vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on a Call of the House? Record the vote.

CLERK: 20 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.
