

word "obsolete" and there is no way that he can put into the category of these various types of laws that have never been used a law such as the one he will attempt to repeal by adding it as a repealer clause to this bill. The reason I am saying it, so that we won't think the issue under discussion is Senator Hoagland's offering of an amendment here but an attempt to establish a trap, if you will. So if Senator Hoagland wants to eliminate that particular section of statute that his amendment deals with, he is doing so because as he told us, it is a section of statute which may be used by some of the areas of the state involved. Since it may be used it is not obsolete. Obsolete means no longer useful, of no further value, outdated, outmoded, it has no further purpose in the present time. Since the bill or law that Senator Hoagland is attempting to remove from the bill is not outdated it does not fit into this bill which deals with obsolete statutes. I support his amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Labeledz, do you want to speak? Your light is on. Do you want to speak to this motion?

SENATOR LABEDZ: No, to my amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Hoagland, do you want to close on your motion?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I will waive closing, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Clerk will read the amendment.

CLERK: (Read Hoagland amendment found on page 1233 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER MARVEL: All those in favor of the Hoagland amendment vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Hoagland's amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The amendment is adopted.
