\$75,000. Crete would lose \$60,000. Platteview would lose \$57,000. Homer would lose \$41,000. Sidney would lose \$38,000. Gibbon would lose \$37,000. Columbus would lose over \$35,000 and that is the way it goes on down the line and we can talk about Spencer and Stuart and the Sandhills and Schuyler Elementary School and it is just that way. A few schools might gain but the great percentage are going to lose if we stay where we are today and go home.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Koch, thank you for thanking me for using some of my time but last year we had one of these kind of bills come through. It was called 103. Sam Cullan slipped that one through on us and I am still smarting over that. That cost me \$85,000. When we will get this printout, number two question and number three, to do what you are saying it will do, will you also show us how much more money it will take?

SENATOR KOCH: Senator Haberman, we can have this to you within a few days and we can use certain figures. We can use a low figure of X number of dollars if there is an agreement here with Senator Warner and a few others and we can take it up to the maximum which might be somewhere around \$35,000,000 to \$40,000,000 and we can show you every school system in your legislative district the exact dollar they would get if this were law and we will do that for you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: And we probably can have these, say, in the next two or three days, four days?

SENATOR KOCH: I would say by sometime in the middle of next week we can have it to you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you, Senator Koch.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman and members, first of all I would like to personally thank Senator Koch. Senator Koch has probably put as much or more into an attempt to arrive at the fair distribution of whatever monies this Legislature may choose to make available for the operation of our public schools. I think it is the responsibility of all of us to work with Senator Koch and others that may be deeply involved in state aid to schools and before we go home that we arrive at some solution.
