SPEAKER MARVEL: We have an amendment on the desk. The Clerk will read.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Dworak moves to amend LB, Senator Koch's amendment I assume, by striking all the stricken language in Section 4 and reinserting. Senator, are you striking the new language? Is that the way it should read?
