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ten of the hundred couples that come, why it is permissible to go ahead and accept that money even though from your point of view because you are unable to trace the identity, because cash was paid at the door, for instance, they are anonymous contributions. Current law permits that and by striking section 19 by way of legislative intent, we are reaffirming the fact that current law permits anonymous contributions of 50 or under pursuant to a fund raising event or from the sale of political merchandise, and we are striking the language in the bill which would permit anonymous contributions generally of \$25.00 or under which has run into considerable, and I believe legitimate, opposition. We are also, as I indicated earlier, striking four other sections and a portion of a fifth section which makes substantive changes, and I would be pleased to answer... to attempt to answer any questions any of you might have about what those particular sections intend to do. So I would ask you to support this motion that Senators Newell, Barrett and I are making to return to Select File for purposes of striking essentially the substantive changes in the act. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barrett, now you are going to close, do I understand? We have some other people that want to speak. Do you want to speak now and then on closing, or will you wait? All right. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Well, Mr. President, you know the bill failed on Final Reading. I think it had about 11 votes. I moved to reconsider it and at that time suggested there would be some amendments that I knew Senator Barrett and the Republicans and Democrats and so on and so forth thought needed to be done. They have come up with these amendments. I think about ninety percent of the amendments are good. I am not real keen on the one, but what the heck. I think the bill is needed because it does straighten out the junk we have in the accountability law to the degree that you can make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. It does improve it. So I urge you to support the amendments and hope that some day we will eliminate the sow's ear.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Dworak. Okay, the Chair recognizes Senator Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask Senator Hoagland some questions.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hoagland, will you respond?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Yes, Mr. President.

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
