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with a native Nebraskan the other day and he was telling me that the State of Nebraska is easily the most beautiful state in the whole United States. He thought that a cornfield in late June was absolutely the most beautiful thing that he could imagine. Now this person is highly respected by me and is highly respected by you but his understanding of scenic beauty and mine have wide differences, and if he would be part of the setting of this definition for roads, the only roads that he would choose in this classification of scenic beauty would be those that go by cornfields. I have no objection to his wanting cornfields to be one of the most beautiful things in the world but Utah happens to be my choice for scenic beauty and if I were to go that route the only place that I would allow us to use that definition would be in Utah. Ambiguous is the word that we hear as it affects statutes and ambiguity is the making of lawsuits, and if you could have anything that would be more subjective than a requirement of scenic beauty, I can't imagine what it might would be. Please adopt my amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Where are the amendments? Do we have the amendments? What page? The Clerk is going to read the amendments over again before we vote on them.

CLERK: Senator Kelly, help me with this so I can be sure that I am correct. It is page 3, line 27, strike "areas of scenic beauty".

SENATOR KELLY: Include "or" in there.

CLERK: Strike "or areas of scenic beauty".

SENATOR KELLY: "Or areas of scenic beauty", yes.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Kelly, do you want to explain your amendment?

SENATOR KELLY: Yes, Mr. Speaker, the explanation of the amendment is simply this. I defy anyone to define "scenic beauty" and the purpose of my amendment would be to remove that ambiguity from this definition.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Did you explain your amendment, Senator Kelly?

SENATOR KELLY: Yes, Mr. Speaker, I did.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Thank you. Senator Hoagland, do you wish to be recognized?
