SENATOR CLARK: Record the vote.

CLERK: 25...26 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Haberman, do you wish to close on your amendment?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Hoagland referred to my being angry over something that happened earlier on the floor and that is not true. I am not angry, Peter. I am just taking the education that you gave me and trying to put it to good use. I feel that when you stand up on the floor and I object to the words "or other interested parties" and you say that you have taken it out, then I have another Senator point out to me where you have added it in somewhere else, I just say that, ha, maybe we had just better take it out to be sure, Senator Hoagland, and under the conditions that you did make that statement and I don't want to say that it wasn't true but I am saying it is just a little gray area in there I would like to have the support to take out the amendment which does add "other interested parties" because that is a new section in the law. I don't think we need "other interested parties". We have already got the counties and the cities involved and this will just make it a lot messier than it is now so I ask for your support on my amendment.

SENATOR CLARK: The question before the House is the adoption of the Haberman amendment. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote nay. It takes 25 votes.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Have you all voted?

CLERK: 11 ayes, 14 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion lost. Any other amendments?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Haberman moves to amend the bill: Strike the words "other interested parties" when they are referred to in the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, do you want to explain it?

SENATOR HABERMAN: I will withdraw the amendment. We have gone far enough.
