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I have pointed out earlier there are some items in that budget which I think could be easily increased and could justify increases. I think that it is interesting for example that one budget was decreased by 31% and another increased by 80%. Certainly there is not much consistency in that kind of an approach. One of the members of the committee tells me that we kept to an overall 7% increase. I'm not overly impressed either because it is easy if Senator Rumery and myself and Senator Kahle are dividing up a pie and we decide that there are only so many bucks in the pie and Senator Kahle and Senator Rumery decide to take it all and leave me with nothing, there are at least two members of that committee that are very happy. Unfortunately, as has happened many times in the past, this year particularly, I'm unhappy. But then the majority of them are happy so we should all be happy. Well I guess the point that I am trying to make is this, folks, you may get away with what you are doing and it may well be for the betterment of the state, but I'm not going to allow you to tell me that I should feel good when I know certain areas which I feel are neglected, are being neglected and other areas which I think could do without the funds are being over emphasized. Now it may very well be that Senator DeCamp's proposal to limit the expenditure to 95% is to great. Maybe it should be 90%. I would just like to cite as an example, only a short time ago the President of the United States presented to the Congress a budget which he said was hard shell, minimal budget. The very best that we could do. All of a sudden when inflation began to run rampant and interest rates began to go up several times a week, the Chief Executive of this nation swallowed his pride and went back before the Congress and presented a balanced budget, with some severe cuts, and some increases in taxation, which I didn't happen to agree with, but he did find places to cut. I would suggest, I will support the DeCamp amendment because I believe that is the only way you are going to find this body being willing to sit down in their seats and listen to an item by item dissertation of the budget. You are going to be called upon when you go back home, ladies and gentlemen, as to why you felt it necessary for a particular agency to have such a substantial increase. Do not think that you can escape the watchful eye of the public.

SENATOR CLARK: You have one minute left, Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Just for the record when you say you can't cut it across the board. Do you remember a few years ago when Governor Exon in the cold months of February called us
