SENATOR MARSH: I request a roll call vote.

Unless we follow that schedule there are going to be many of you who are on a priority list. You have bills that you would like to have considered. The Clerk will call the roll.

SPEAKER MARVEL: A roll call vote has been requested. For what purpose do you arise, Senator George?

SENATOR GEORGE: A point of information, Mr. President. We just...

SPEAKER MARVEL: We had a Call of the House.
