SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, maybe I should ask Senator DeCamp a question first. Senator DeCamp, given the shortness of time and the real interest of a lot of people in this bill, if this passes on are you willing to sit down and work on some, perhaps some additional amendments to the bill before it comes back around again?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Sure.

SENATOR DeCAMP: I'll clarify. I believe if we did not address the bankruptcy issue in this manner at this time, that you are going to see a move to not even be this generous and it will come shortly.
