

PRESIDENT: No, no, just for that one motion. That is all. Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Speaker, we are running into the same problem that we had through the whole session by changing things around, taking things out of order, and now we have gotten ourselves into a mess again. I object to changing the rules. If these are our rules, lets stick with them. These bills would have come up in the order that they were on the agenda, we would be half way through it now. Now we have it screwed up.

PRESIDENT: All right, any further discussion? Would everybody turn their lights off unless they want to speak on this. It is very confusing to preside over this body when about 20 lights are on and only a couple want to speak. Would everybody turn off your lights and then turn them on again if you want to speak on the motion to suspend for the purpose of taking up the kill motion. Senator Fitzgerald, do you want to speak to this?

SENATOR FITZGERALD: Mr. Speaker, I oppose the amendment. I think that it is a courtesy that we should give Senator Warner his. . . hardly anybody here that I have talked to understands 722. I oppose the kill motion.

PRESIDENT: We are just talking about whether we should suspend the rules right now. On the motion to suspend the rules.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President, members of the body. I oppose suspending the rules and the reason that I oppose it, if we do it for this particular bill, then I am sure that we will be doing it for most of the other bills all day. It is true, we are all jockeying for a position on our own bills. I can see why the members of this body want to do that and so I would urge you to not suspend the rules, to use the rules as we have them in our book and therefore I think that we would move right along today.

PRESIDENT: All right, Chair recognizes Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: If we don't suspend the rules on 722 on the kill motion, will that lay over for a day?

PRESIDENT: Yes.

SENATOR CLARK: It would have to lay over.

PRESIDENT: Yes, it would have to lay over.

SENATOR CLARK: That would mean that it would probably be dead anyway, because we probably couldn't take it up.
