SENATOR MURPHY: Yes, sir, a question of Senator Warner.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner.

SENATOR MURPHY: Senator Warner, Mr. Vickers' amendment and this bill as originally drafted would have distributed the additional funds under the ADM basis of foundation aid, per pupil aid, previous to your current motion, right?

SENATOR WARNER: I thought it was sixty-forty percent, sixty percent foundation, forty percent equalization under Senator Vickers' amendment.

SENATOR MURPHY: Senator Vickers was...I thought he amended the foundation aid section.

SENATOR WARNER: I believe the way the wording is, Senator, it allocates it to two different sections of law.

SENATOR MURPHY: So we are not relieving those small districts who receive...who have access to only forty percent of this so-called state aid...

SENATOR WARNER: No, no, no, no.

SENATOR MURPHY: They are putting the whole thing under equalization, the sixty-forty foundation-equalization.

SENATOR WARNER: No, sir.

SENATOR MURPHY: Good. I have got it wrong then.

SENATOR WARNER: Yes, sir.

SENATOR MURPHY: Tell me again.

SENATOR WARNER: It is a sixty-forty percent split. Now as a matter of fact, and I should have had copies run off, as a matter of fact, under a sixty-forty percent split which was the original concurrence in here, all of this additional \$20 million I am talking about will be allocated under a average daily membership. However, with the passage of LB 486, that is an indexed average daily membership in which kindergarten, as I recall, is one. You will have to help me, Senator Koch. I think one through six is one point two or something. It is a weighted feature, a weighted factor, weighted index as the grade advances up to the twelfth.
