last six weeks to two months. But, because of one reason or another, special order, special considerations, some of which was for myself or what other reason, protracted debate, re-considerations, reconsiderations one after another, those bills are going to die. Now the Department of Agriculture would like very much to be able to inspect your food and your restaurant facilities in the manner in which they need to be inspected. But if you do not pass those bills they are going to be handicapped. I don't think that anyone is going to die of poisoning and if someone got sick we might learn to work a little more expeditiously. But I think that it behooves all of us to recognize that there are times in this body and on this floor when we as gentlemen and ladies grant consideration to each other that we eventually find, wind up hurting ourselves. Now there used to be a certain amount of consideration given for that sort of thing, but as of today some very worthwhile bills will die on General File while a considerable amount of trash has become law simply because those of us who had those bills did not deem it proper to try to move them in advance of another piece of legislation. I want to say once again for the record that when we get to Select File LB 882 is reposing there with about 15 amendments to it. So, if any of you are behind 882 you can make up your mind you are either going to have to have a long evening or else you had better go and get your lunch now, your dinner now, because it doesn't seem to be the prerogative of this body to move expeditiously when we get to that point. I very frankly would support Senator Labeledz and I would stay here till midnight if necessary to clean the thing up because when a certain group of people have moved a certain bill or two they will absent themselves from this floor and we will not see them again. Once more, in this instance, it does not pay to be courteous on this floor because the non-controversial but necessary bills will get shoved to the background and the trash goes on out the blower first.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I think Senator Schmit hit upon something that we ought to think about a little bit. We have been moving stuff off of General File fifteen minute debate time limit, not even putting committee amendments on it and that means that work has to be done on Select File. Now if you think that we are going to breeze
