LB 991

SPEAKER MARVEL: Indefinite...let's see, the kill motion. Do you want to put the motion? Okay, the motion is to suspend the rules and take up the kill motion and I would suggest to you that if we don't recess in about five minutes, all the work that we have done this afternoon and this evening is going to go down the drain. Bigger than you. Do you have a report, Senator? Will you give the report please?

SENATOR WESELY: I just talked to Emory Burnett and he thinks right now, if we quit right now without passing LB 991, it would still take...no, this is just, it would take half an hour. Now, wait a minute, I am just telling you where we stand. Now if we pass 991, and I don't know how much longer that would take but maybe another half an hour for that, so at that stage then if we deal with this bill and pass it, that is an hour, and then we have what, two more bills? I don't know how long that would take but we might be able to do them, we might not. It would be cutting it pretty close.

SPEAKER MARVEL: I guess I don't understand. If we proceed to finish up with 991, then what?

SENATOR WESELY: We should be okay. We should get it back by eleven or eleven-thirty.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, so the motion at the moment is the suspension of the rules to take up the kill motion on 991, is that the motion? Okay, all those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 10 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to suspend the rules. The kill motion is Senator Landis'.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The rules are suspended. The Chair recognizes....okay. A record vote is requested.

CLERK: Record vote read. (See page 1870, Legislative Journal.) 33 ayes, 10 nays on the motion to suspend the rules, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion is carried. Rules are suspended. The Chair recognizes Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, I will reluctantly withdraw my kill motion since it is apparent that the body is
