presented. We have, I believe, close to a dozen of those. If we move rapidly, we may be able to finish up this afternoon yet with the following rules changes but I think we should keep in mind that they are rather lengthy and of some controversy and so we do need to move quickly and work diligently on them because there are a number of them before us. So at this time I think dealing with the fourth division of the rules which is all the remaining rules other than those three we just discussed, I think the amendments that are up there now are in order to be presented. I suppose it is in order, do I move the adoption of the remaining rules and from there amend? Is that not in order, Pat?

SPEAKER MARVEL: You made the pending motion, Senator Wesely?

SENATOR WESELY: Yes, I move the remaining rules in the blue book be adopted by the Legislature as permanent rules for this session.

SPEAKER MARVEL: We are ready now for Senator Beutler's amendments.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a series of amendments pending to the balance of the permanent rules. The first one is offered by Senator Beutler and it has to do with the scheduling of bills, priority bills.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Beutler, I think it would be well if you can designate for the benefit of the Legislature the pages in the Journal where the material is found.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, for purposes of this particular amendment, you should have had passed out to you at your desk a sheet that has at the top Proposed Rule Change, Rule 5, new Section 6, Scheduling of Bills - Priority Bills, and with some hand scribbling substitute up at the top. If there is anyone that doesn't have one of those, I will have a Page bring it. While you are glancing at that, I might tell you a little story about how I got interested in the rules of the Legislature. It happens that sometime ago I had the occasion to travel in the Orient and included in those travels was a trip to a little island called Hua Hin and on that little island there is a little church, a little whitewashed church, kind of a Christian oasis in a Buddhist land. Now when I got inside that church, I looked around and I saw back in the corner a skeleton and this skeleton had some writing underneath it. It was in sanskrit but to translate loosely for you it went something like this. "I had no respect for law
