SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator ioodrich.
SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President and members of the body, would Senator Dworak come tack to his mike, I need to ask him a couple of questions. Would Senator Dworak yield to a couple of questions, please. Now the reason I am going to ask Senator Dworak a courle of questions is the very fact that he has got it fust backwards from what it actually is in the bill, and i rould like to remind you, number one that this is not my bill, there is nothing wrong with the bill, but it is not my bill. And since I was challenged in the newnimer over the weekend here in Lincoln, $I$ will really state i am an electrical contractor, I deal in this subject matter, but $I$ am not...I don't have any conflict of interest with this particular bill, so I want to lay it out for you right quick. All right, Senator Dworak, on pape E, you were saging, for example, that you are trying to get to the meaning of Section 9 on page ?, but in order to do that you go back to line 3 on page 6 , it says, "nothing in Section 81-571 to 81-5114 shall be construed to", in other worls nothing in this section shall be construed to do what these various things are as are listed here. Nothing in this legislation shall be construed to require the resistration of apprentice electricians in municipalities which have a population of less than 5,000 inhabitants.

SENATOR DWORAK: Thank you, Serator Goodrich, for pointing that out to me. I have no opposition to the bill.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Thank you.

## SENATOR CLARK PRESIDING

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Haverman.
SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, fellow colleagues, may Senator Rumery respond to a question, please. Senatcr Rumery, does this mean in Imperial, Nebraska, population of 1700 people, a young mar is working, for a electrician, does this mean he has to ret a license and be repistered?

SENATOR RUMERY: No. ilo. You are not 5,000 population.
SENATOR HABERMAN: No, it says under 5,000.
SENATOR RUMERY: No, it exempts under 5,000.
SENATOR HABERMAN: It ©ays mder y,000. Okay, I have no questions with it then. Thank you, Senator Rumery.
