part of the hearing process under which they would talk about it. I really don't think that we'd be talking about all state roads and highways and you wouldn't be talking about it for the full stretch of the highway. It would be whatever...

SENATOR RUMERY: Sections?

SENATOR NEWELL: ...sections of the highway, whatever conditions exist, but again, it is hard for the Legislature to write those kinds of specifics down. That is why we want to authorize the State Patrol to do that.

SENATOR RUMERY: You consider this then actually a correction in the law that would nail down this authority?

SENATOR NEWELL: That is correct.

SENATOR RUMERY: Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: Mr. President, members, we have got about five hundred fifty, sixty, seventy bills. The hearings are going up until nine o'clock at night and now we have got a new long time hearing. The Patrol right now closes the roads when due to weather out in my country. If we have got a blizzard, they do close the roads and should. I think this will be more of an interim study than it would a bill. I don't think there is anything right now that I know of that would make it an emergency that we should add a bill and I am completely against voting for any new bills outside of the bills from the Department of Appropriations...couldn't think of the name, Appropriations, but I will not vote to introduce any new bill and I don't care what they are. If it is this serious, they should have been introduced in the first place. Thank you.
