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is what you want to do, that is fine and dandy, overrule the Speaker's order and lets go after lunch and argue it on the floor. That is fine with me. I'm trying to get some meeting of the minds if possible. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I take exceptions to Senator Vickers remarks. And, I would like to call to his attention, are you here, Senator Vickers? What about the little water collation that you put together a couple of years ago? Ha? Wasn't there any smoke in that room because none of you smoked? Now you know who met on that water collation. You had your little side meetings. Did you invite the press? Hell no, you didn't invite the press.

SENATOR CLARK: Lets try not to use this type of language on the floor.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you, I stand corrected. Goodness, gracious, no you didn't invite the press, Senator Vickers, but your little group got together. You are going to write the water bills. Now you stand up here and you chastise and criticize for following your leadership. You holler and cry about what do the people think. I can tell you what they thought about your little meetings: Because I heard about it. I said no, I don't want any part of it. I came to one of them and that was enough. So I strongly object to you saying what you do is all right but when somebody else tries to take an issue that is very important and iron it out, you object. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Goodrich, you want to recess us until 1:30.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, I move we recess until 1:30.

SENATOR CLARK: All those in favor say aye, opposed nay. We are recessed until 1:30.
