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basic concept into the law with the need that we have acknowledged and which will continue to be a need in the next few years to continue to find individual situations and to toss them into one category or the other, campaign contributions, expenditures or personal expenditures. But the need right now in getting that basic concept into the law is not for a study. The need is to bite the bullet and get it into the law so that we can begin the process of refining the law. If there are individual situations that Senator Fenger is concerned with, we have invited all members of the Legislature to come to us to identify those specific situations and if they felt so strong about it, to actually put it into the statute and certain constitutional officers in this state and certain individual senators have, in fact, come to us and asked for that. Amendments were made on General File to accommodate some. Additional amendments will be made here on Select File to accommodate others. In short, it seems to me that the process and the progress of this bill has been very reasonable and very rational so far. Why all of a sudden we want to indefinitely postpone it, I do not understand from my own background. I do not understand from Senator Fenger's comments. It seems to me that it makes no sense whatsoever. So I would appreciate your support in rejecting the motion to indefinitely postpone. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I have been giving this subject some serious consideration and I have also been thinking about how the public does not want to pay senators. Now I will not take any money that I raise for a purported campaign purpose and use it for anything else but if there are senators in this body who are willing to take that money that they raise and spend it for those various things, let them do it. That is what the public wants. The public does not want a legislator to be paid money above the table. They want the legislators to be like college athletes where you pay them off with turf shoes or football tickets that are converted to cash or you give them money in lieu of eating at the training table or you allow them to stay with host families in Lincoln who can give them stereos, radios, make automobiles available to them, plush living quarters which are violations of the N.C.A.A. and Big 8 standards. Nevertheless, this is how those rules are circumvented and they are accepted and the University keeps a straight arrow image. So why should a greater burden be placed on the senators who face such universal scorn and contempt throughout the state when the football heroes and
