SPEAKER MARVEL: Except at the moment we are not trying to encourage more amendments.

PRESIDENT: All right, a point well taken. The Chair recognizes Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think that is a point that ought to be determined very quickly because based upon the law of averages here we will have an amendment on every single bill before that time comes and we will be back to ground zero, and you know it is kind of unfortunate that you can stop any bill that way. I think we ought to make up our minds pretty quick. I guess you are either going to declare a moratorium or a deadline. If you have a moratorium, it is as of right now. If you have a deadline, it is at a certain point in time this morning. If it is a deadline, we will have amendments on every bill.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Rumery.

SENATOR RUMERY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, do we need a motion to accept the Speaker's direction on this?

PRESIDENT: No. Unless somebody objects, and tries to overrule his order, then it takes 30 votes on your part to overrule him or his order. So if you have got 30 votes you can do it. All right, we will commence then with agenda item #4, resolutions. We are going to start with resolution #115. Senator Howard Peterson, are you ready with that one? Mr. Clerk, do you want to read LR 115.

CLERK: Yes, Mr. President, LR 115 offered by Senators Howard Peterson and Lowell Johnson. It is found on page 1806 of the Journal. (Read.)

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Howard Peterson.

SENATOR H. PETERSON: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, it has been my privilege to serve on the Board of Trustees at Midland Lutheran College for some over eighteen years, and worked with various presidents at that college, and it has really been a privilege to work with Dr. Dale Lund, to recognize him for the work that he has done with that institution and with the Independent College Foundation in this state and the other independent colleges.
