SENATOR KOCH: Just Thursday's.

SENATOR LAMB:were sent over to him yesterday. There was no commitment....(interruption).

SENATOR KOCH: From now on we ought to get it in writing rather than by a carrier.

SENATOR LAMB: Okay, it's in writing. Senator Marvel sent it around to your desk. We have copies of it. It's in writing. Senator Marvel's understanding of the agreement is in writing and was circulated yesterday.

SENATOR KOCH: I didn't get it. Well, I wouldn't agree with you. I thought when you talked to me privately it was all the bills about from next Friday as opposed to this day.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Marvel. Does that answer your question? I don't think there was any agreement that the Governor was going to send back any bills today that he has over there, only those that were yesterday or before. That was my understanding. Is that your understanding, Senator Marvel?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Originally, I was told that there would be no cooperative effort to veto the bills and get the vetoes back. As time went on and this took two or three weeks, it changed, and it was my understanding, Senator Koch, that by the last confrontation that we had that the bills would be back according to what Senator Lamb had said. Is that what you want, Senator Clark?

SENATOR CLARK: It's not me. I think it's Senator Koch. Does that satisfy you, Senator Koch?

SENATOR KOCH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, but the reason I have this concern, I have just been advised that 352 will go over there today but the Governor will wait and he will veto it while we are gone. Now 352 is a pretty damn simple bill, and he vetoed several others that are far more complicated today and they are back today.

SENATOR CLARK: The first motion on the desk. Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: On the same issue that they just discussed in terms of the vetoes. The way I interpret a letter that I read in reading the Constitution, I think there is another veto that he has sent over here,
