gained or whether we just don't spend more time on Final Reading when we finally catch up with these bills. Now the process didn't bother me so much earlier on because many of those bills were bills that carried over and most of us had had an opportunity to look at them but now many of the ones on Select File are now, especially towards the bottom, new bills, bills that did not get much attention on General File and several of which quite frankly I and I think many others have not had an opportunity to very closely review. So I guess I'm hoping that at least from this point on after today that perhaps we don't use that process. I don't know how others feel but I just wanted to throw that remark out. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, I would just like to reply to Senator Beutler. Senator Beutler, would you rather just hang on each bill and then allow these bills on Select File to stay there until we are practically through the session? I get caught once in a while too but I don't see how we can proceed without doing something of this because as you noticed the two or three bills that we handled this morning, the rest of them should just sit there? I don't think that is quite fair to the rest of the bills following so I would approve of the Speaker's actions here.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, I would just simply point out that there is only so much time and whether you take them, a hard one and then a couple easy ones and then a hard one and a couple easy ones, whichever way you do it there is only so much time. And it seems to me that what happens is is that bills are sometimes not properly reviewed when they are scooted through the process. This is a one house Legislature. We don't have two houses. The three stages of debate are supposed to be very important. The second effect of this as we get towards the end of the year is to pile up a bunch of difficult bills and then we get to feeling frustrated and then sometimes the people with the difficult bills don't get them heard because in come the priority bills and we don't deal with some of the more difficult issues even though those more difficult issues may be more important to the people of the state. So I'm not sure that anything is gained. In fact, I suspect that maybe something is lost by using this kind of procedure even though on first blush it looks as if we are quickly moving some things. Thank you.
