SENATOR KOCH: Do you know what the fiscal effect is? Well I know the schools are in it.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Do I know what it is?

SENATOR KOCH: Yes.

SENATOR DeCAMP: All you have to do is read the bill.

SENATOR KOCH: Well, Senator DeCamp, what is the fiscal impact to the State of Nebraska. I think it should be a matter of public record.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Well it's kind of like how many children are going to be doing this or that. How many ads are going to be placed? How many people are going to die? How many people are going to.... I don't know.

SENATOR KOCH: Senator DeCamp, is the Games Department affected by this?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Is the who?

SENATOR KOCH: Is the Games Department affected by this, the Commission?

SENATOR DeCAMP: I'd have to check and see. (Interruption.)

SENATOR KOCH: I'd probably ask my question of Senator Haberman. He's one of the most fiscal men I know on this floor. Senator Haberman, what is the fiscal note to the state in relationship to its agencies?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Koch, there's no fiscal impact to the office of Secretary of State.

SENATOR KOCH: There isn't?

SENATOR HABERMAN: The majority is legal notices of the Capitol Improvement Programs, no input; cost, \$8 thousand Board of Educational Lands and Funds; \$15 thousand for the Department of Roads. That is all it shows on the fiscal note impact.

SENATOR KOCH: But you favor this fiscal note, right?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Pardon?

SENATOR KOCH: Are you in favor of this spending?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Well I got up and said it is unusual for me to stand up here and support this bill but I have my flak jacket on.
