SENATOR LAMB: Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Senator Lamb and members of the body I rise to oppose the motion basically to what Senator Vickers said and Senator Newell. I'm surprised at Senator Hoagland who has always been one of those in here who wants to remain principled in how we conduct the business of this state and affairs. I know the this hape is on this bill someplace. I appreciate that. But there have been several times that I have been prompted during the session to suspend the rules as well like I could have on the christian school issue when people were playing around with it, didn't do it, not a full discussion debate the day it meet a rather tragic death... I think. But I think for us if we are getting tired, and I'll quote Senator Chambers, those of you who are tired you had probably go home. Some of us are still going to sit here and persevere. If 568 doesn't see the light of this session we still have a good bill on the books that we can live with if they enforce it, including attorneys and others who are responsible for that kind of positions.

SENATOR LAMB: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President, I call the question.

SENATOR LAMB: That won't be necessary, you are the last speaker Senator. Senator Hoagland to close.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Let me just close briefly, Senator Lamb. This basically is a decision that all of you are going to have to make. The last four amendments have had to do with the death penalty. We have a number of other amendments coming along, I think some are serious amendments to this bill and some of them aren't. We have been debating the bill since before dinner. We have got an awfully lot of work left in the remaining six days of the session. I'm satisfied with the condition the bill is in right now. Senator Haberman, Nichol and I along with John Goc and others have worked out the bill over the weeks and have arrived at these compromise amendments which the body has now adopted. I'm satisfied that it is a good bill. I don't think it needs any more changes. We have got a lot of other work ahead of us. It is late. It is 9:30 p.m. I think we should suspend the rule; and advance the bill and go home for the night. We have a long week ahead of us and the longer we stay here tonight the more difficult it is going to be for us tomorrow, Wednesday and Thursday. But again it is a judgment that all of you can make.
