SENATOR DWORAK: Well, I don't see anything wrong with just putting it down in the order in deference to those people that aren't here because I have been in that position myself a couple of times and they may have something...

SENATOR CLARK: Do you want to move to do that? Let's get something moving.

SENATOR DWORAK: I move that we just change the order of the bill and read'it this morning but at a later time.

SENATOR CLARK: All right, Senator Nichol. The motion before the House is to lay the bill over until the others get here.

SENATOR NICHOL: It would be a little bit different, Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, if these items hadn't been discussed before. They have been discussed before. The bill has been hashed over and hashed over and hashed over and I don't think that Senator Dworak or Senator Koch are going to be greatly changed in their opinion as to whether they are going to vote for the bill or not because of these two amendments that are pending. I don't really think that these are put up here to kill the bill because they were put up yesterday at which time they could have been discussed had we had time. Since we didn't, obviously these two people knew that this bill was up first this morning because they were here last night when the agenda was out. If they are deliberately gone, which I don't think they are doing, but if they didn't make the effort to come defend their amendments, then I think it is time to go ahead and read the bill. object to postponing.

SENATOR CLARK: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: The question.

SENATOR CLARK: The question has been called for. There is no need for that, there is no one else on. Senator Kahle was on yet, do you want to talk?

SENATOR KAHLE: Oh, do I have a chance? Mr. President, I agree with Senator Koch. I think common courtesy, we were here to midnight last night. I don't know whether Senator Kilgarin was here or not and I think we can wait and change the order enough so that we can read that bill some time today without causing that kind of a situation. So I think common courtesy and we have done it before. We have always done it, so I think we ought to move the bill down a notch or two until they get here.
