PRESIDENT: Read it again. We are not going to get any where by debating this thing here so please refrain from debate. Keep it to the motion to recess and whether we can accomplish anything by recessing to that time. Mr. Clerk, read that part of the...

CLERK: Mr. President, the opinion addressed to Senator Schmit reads as follows: (Read Opinion No. 148, found on page 100, Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: All right, as I say, we are not going to countenance any debate. The matter before the House is simply whether to recess and to what time or whether you are going to recess. Let's see how it goes. The motion is to recess until 7:00 p.m. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Yes, Senator Pirsch. The same rule applies on this one as on adjournment so I will go by voting on simple majority. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 8 nays on the motion to recess, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Recess until 7:00 p.m., the Legislature will recess until 7:00 p.m. tonight.
