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bill and it was a bill that many people said was too regulatory. I am very proud to announce today that the largest association of nursing homes has told me I may say publicly that they wholeheartedly endorse all of those bills that I passed. But at the same time I have been a business woman and I have owned three different businesses myself. I know what it means to have government regulation. Believe me, if you think there is bureaucracy in government, you should have been an insurance agent for twenty years like I was. I know what rules and regulations mean. What my hope is, to use the Administrative Rules and Regulations Committee as a board of arbitration between state government and all the industries in Nebraska that are regulated by them. The first thing I would do if elected chairman today is to send out a letter to major industries that are regulated by the state and ask them, is there any one regulation you can pick or choose today that keeps you from making a profit and loss...or loss? Or is there one that is so cumbersome that it is requiring so many forms? And if so, please write to the committee and advise us what it is. When we receive the responses, we would then send these letters to the directors of the respective agencies and ask them to attend a committee hearing on just that particular regulation and we would then have the committee listen to business, private enterprise, tell us perhaps here is a regulations, senators, that has been on the books for thirty years and in the computer age we no longer need that. Perhaps we would have government say, here is a regulation that is absolutely necessary for the safety of the people of this state. And the committee would listen to both sides. And as we go into Executive Session it would be my hope then that the committee would come out and either advise that particular department of government to try to work with business in changing the regulation to bringing it up to the Twentieth Century, to perhaps do away with it entirely if it is the vote of the committee that it is not necessary, or if it is in a case where business really does need that regulation, we would write to the business industry and give them also the vote of the committee. In the event that a state agency would refuse to change a regulation, which the committee votes and says it is absolutely unnecessary, then as chairman I would ask the committee if they wanted to introduce a bill the following year eliminating that regulation, if possible. In other words, I would do what I said I would do two years ago with the nursing home industry. I will move heaven and earth to get rid of a lot
