

certainly the Speaker would have the greatest prestige in this body. That is the essence of my amendment, just to cut the number of people going to Washington down from 20 to 10, and then designate the Speaker as the leader of the group. I might also suggest that in Section 3 of the resolution you could consider using those days toward the end of the following week when we are not in session, I think the 23, 24 and 25. So then the Legislature would not have to recess any more than we are planning to recess at this point. So at this point I would ask the adoption of my amendment.
