SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is the adoption of the Hannibal amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk. Senator Hannibal.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Call for a record vote, please.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Record vote has been asked for.

CLERK: (Read record vote found on page 401 of the Legislative Journal.) 10 ayes, 29 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The amendment fails. Do you have any other amendments, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: I do have an amendment from Senator DeCamp, found on page 392 of the Journal. Senator DeCamp is excused.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Has he authorized anyone to carry that amendment? If not, we'll pass over it and go on to the bill itself. You have no other amendments, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: I have nothing other than the resolution, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Chambers, your light is on. Did you wish to speak about the amendment...excuse me, about the resolution?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. Very briefly, Mr. Chairman. Since I only have five minutes, it would be brief whether I intended to make it brief or not. What I would like to see...I'm dealing with the agricultural aspect of it again. Commonwealth was discussed interminably last session because it was a serious issue involving people mostly in the City of Lincoln but the policies of the state government. Agriculture is more widespread as an issue. So what I want to deal with again is the delegation going to Washington. Senator Rod Johnson, Senator Vard Johnson and others, I'm sure, are going to try to have some concrete legislative proposals in place as enacted laws by the time you leave for Washington. Going to Washington is good. I think what the senators ought to do, in addition to going to Washington, is go to Nebraska. How can a senator justify himself or
