

become much, much more difficult and it also becomes apparent that those two political figures can control, any one of them can control a particular claim. So this bill, as far as I am concerned, goes from being bad policy to terrible policy. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: There are no other lights on for recognition. Senator Wesely, do you wish to close?

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Mr. President, members, the motion before you is to indefinitely postpone LB 136. Senator Beutler just brought to light this is a very, very important proposal because...it is a very, very serious proposal because as was originally presented to you, the Governor through the three appointed positions that are on the Claims Board would continue to have majority control when, in fact, any large claim or \$5,000 for tort claims would have to have a unanimous vote. Well now Senator Beutler just came back and we have confirmed that on the miscellaneous claims as well, a unanimous vote is required. So in both cases, adding those two individuals is no longer having a majority control through the Governor as the head of the executive branch. You, in fact, change the whole complexion of the situation and I think for the bad. I think we changed this back in 1981 because we had a problem.

PRESIDENT: I think Senator Lamb is asking for a point of order. What point do you want to make, Senator?

SENATOR LAMB: I've not had a chance to reply to Senator Beutler's latest problem. You know, if you want to amend it to three people, have two people...(interruption.)

SENATOR WESELY: Wait a minute. Mr. President, that's not a point of order.

PRESIDENT: Yes, yes. Senator Lamb, let me as the Speaker...Senator Wesely, if you would allow me to back up. Senator Lamb's light was still on, but he did speak twice, but do you want to ask a question of Senator Wesely, Senator Lamb?

SENATOR WESELY: I don't think that is in order, Mr. President, frankly.

PRESIDENT: Continue, Senator.
