

a proclamation. Usually they don't even notice the statute. In any event, besides the fact that it is not used and it is not practicable because of the \$200 limitation, it also has some dangerous implications in it in the sense that it suggests that the reward will be given to a person who arrests a person committing the crime and delivers that person to the sheriff as contrasted to the other reward programs that we have where ordinarily we offer the reward for information leading to the arrest rather than the arrest and delivery. And this self-help implication in here, the idea that maybe somebody is encouraged to try to go out and arrest somebody themselves and deliver it is not a particularly good thing to have into the law. So it is impractical and it is not used and it is probably not even a good idea. With that I would ask advancement of the bill, Mr. Speaker.
