SENATOR HABERMAN: Very well. Second question, there isn't any financial sheet with this. Should there be one?

SENATOR VICKERS: No, there is no expense to the state. These are simply flow-through funds from the federal government.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Thank you, Senator Vickers.

SENATOR MARSH: Thank you, Senator Haberman. Seeing no other lights, we are now ready to vote on the advancement of LB 417. All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. Senator Marsh voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Marsh voting yes.

SENATOR MARSH: The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance the bill, Madam President. (See page 450 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR MARSH: The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Madam President, LB 42 was offered by Senator Jerry Miller. (Read title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 10 of this year. It was referred to the Public Health and Welfare Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by the Public Health and Welfare Committee.
