PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Nelson.

SENATOR NELSON: Mr. President, members of the body, I do support a continuation of the manual as used in 1984. The classification of the lands is something that needs to be done. I think it has been well explained here. I might also say that time is of the essence in our local county offices. I've been contacted, some of them are on computer basis, time is not as important. But the counties that are not on computer would like to see some guidance and some direction. I do urge the body to support LB 30 and keep the land and the values at a status quo, as they have been for this year.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Haberman. Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, it quite could be possible that I have a misunderstanding of the whole thing. But the statement was made that we're not changing anything. It seems to me we must be changing something or the amendment wouldn't be there. But, however, I will take the word of Senator Carsten and Senator Vard Johnson that nothing will be changed and it will continue on the way it is and withdraw the amendment. All right. Do you have to vote on it? Okay. Then I will suggest to the body they do not support removing Section 4. However, we will watch what happens under Section 4, and I hope the gentlemen are absolutely right. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Warner. Senator Warner, do you want to say something on this second point?

SENATOR WARNER: I guess this one I just support the adoption of this portion of the committee amendment and repeat the position that the soil surveys, I think, really started in the early 1970s, as I recall. They are being processed as fast as, not only money, but as personnel, primarily with SCS, is available. It is really a question of equity for individual property owners more than any one
