His remarks were also made that in reality much of the boards of examiners and much of these different organizations are set up to protect the organization or the profession. Senator Warner said that several of these agencies have continuing education programs within their boards. That is true too. We have continuing education for funeral directors and embalmers. Some of you recall the arguments we had a couple of years ago on that. Interesting, however, because continuing education is supposed to be put on to insure the "professionalism" of the group involved because of the changing state of the art, because things change in the state of the art of the profession you are in. That is what the argument was for embalmers because embalming has changed so much in the last couple years that we need to have continuing education for that. Interesting, however, that we do not have continuing education for the medical society. The doctors don't have it. But then medicine doesn't change very much from year to year evidently. Interesting also we don't have continuing education for the attorneys in our state because law doesn't change very much from time to time. But we do have it for
