SENATOR WESELY: I think the examples in the last few years of our start-up would have many more people supporting this than in the past, and the 47 percent in favor vote is very close.

SENATOR LAMB: Thank you. Well, I really don't think it would facilitate the process that much and sometimes I think one of the weaknesses of our system here, the one-house Legislature, is that we have a tendency to move too quickly on some bills. We don't have a second chamber to act as a compensating balance, as it were, and that it's not really one of the problems of this Legislature that things maybe get off to a slow start. And I do believe that the new people that are coming into the Legislature need that extra time, more than the month which would be provided under this constitutional amendment, that that time is of value to them between November and the beginning of the session in January. I know it certainly is of value to me even though I have been here a few years. That is a time when many times I try to get around the district to reassess the positions of people and it is easier to do it, it is better and more valid after the election. Sometimes we are involved in the election process but then I feel more comfortable going around my district after the election is over, saying to the people, okay, what do you think we should be doing and not being influenced by me and other people being up for election. So I believe at this point we should indefinitely postpone the resolution.

SPEAKER NICHOL: I have several lights on. I will need to check with each of you if you want to speak about the kill motion. Senator Warner, the kill motion.

SENATOR WARNER: Well, Mr. President and members of the Legislature, at this point I would rise to oppose the kill motion. I have been thinking about this issue for sixteen years, I just told Senator Wesely, because back in '69 Senator Adamson had such a proposal that the Legislature adopted and after he resigned I moved to reconsider and it was taken off because I felt that was not the right policy. But I have been thinking about it since and it seems to me that maybe this isn't such a bad idea for a number of reasons. I would have a lot of sympathy for what Senator Vickers said, that all the bills perhaps were introduced,
