I think in this one it does make a great deal of difference because by substituting "and" we are demanding that our law enforcement officials prove two actions as opposed to just one. I know Senator Landis did an excellent job here a few minutes ago talking about a ridiculous situation whereby we would...by leaving the language as it is, we would be saying that a mere representation is enough to convict an individual and he talked about saying, buy this chair and it will get you high, buy this rock and it will get you high. By ridiculing this particular language here in such a way probably raised some doubts in some people's mind. I am concerned about another hypothetical situation and let me draw that hypothetical for you here just a second. Hypothetical situation is I have a bottle of this commodity right here on my desk. I talk to Senator Smith and say, Senator Smith, I've got something here I think you may want to buy. I pull her over into the corner, pull out these commodities that are in a bottle that look like controlled substances, take them out of the bottle, they look like controlled substances, and I say, here, do you want to buy these? I'll sell these to you for \$5.00 a tablet. She buys them. If this amendment goes through I can't be found guilty of anything because I haven't represented anything. It has to have both the appearance and the representation. I'm afraid if we pass this amendment we put again, as Senator Hoagland has said, we put the standards of proof much higher than they really need to be. We make this legislation much more difficult to enforce. We put a loophole in this law that is large enough for any of these distributors, manufacturers to drive a truck through. I'd urge you to seriously consider this amendment and vote against it. Thank you.
