Language they struck had required before this that the person expressly or implicitly represents this as a controlled substance and is capable of endangering the life of the person who receives it and they struck that. They don't want it to have to cause harm...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...because most of these things don't. They just want it to be a situation where you've got something and these people out in West Omaha don't want their kids to have it. So what they are saying, if you're going to sell some white crosses, by God, you make sure it's the real thing, a truth in advertising. And if you don't give the real thing, you're a criminal just like if you did. One reason I didn't tell you the difference between those misdemeanors is to demonstrate that we on the floor don't know the difference in these punishments, but we're going to say that these kids out there will know the difference and they will say, well, if I sell a look-alike, it's a something, something misdemeanor. If I sell the real thing, it's a something, something felony. And most people on this floor can't tell you the difference. So what you're really telling them, sell the real thing and if I were a dope pusher I'd tell these kids, look, if you sell that stuff you're selling you're a criminal anyway. Sell the real thing, you'll make more money, and when they buy it, you hooked them and you've got customers from now on. So what we're really saying is if you're in this business, tell the truth in advertising and you make sure that if you say it is an amphetamine, it's an amphetamine. You make sure if you say cocaine, it's cocaine. That's what you want and that's what you're getting.
