

DeCamp is saying, we are literally wiping out what Amendment 4 dictated us to do and I don't believe that is what the people of the state wanted us to accomplish in this session. I think we are headed down the right road. I was convinced clear from the beginning that we are doing it properly, and with due process, we give careful consideration to what we are doing, and this Revenue Committee is going, without any question, put a bill to the floor for us to work on and work through that will take care of that '86 valuation. I would hope that we would not adopt this amendment, and as Senator Warner suggested, go ahead and pass it and move on down the road and attack the long-term solution with a bill that will be forthcoming and we do have plenty of time to do that without any question. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Carsten. Senator Beutler, it appears that you may close.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, if I may, Senator Carsten, may I ask you a question? If all we have is a matter of fact interpretation, then perhaps that can be clarified, but I didn't understand your remarks in the same way that Senator Warner did. Do you agree, sir, with Senator Warner's interpretation that in the event this bill is operative in 1986 that farm property will be valued like commercial property and residential property, actual value, do you agree with that?

SENATOR CARSTEN: Yes, I believe that is right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: So in that event, both introducers as I understand it their intent is the same and it is that...Senator Hefner, you are shaking your head. Would you like to make a remark, Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Beutler, this bill is for one year only, period, then it reverts back to the way it was.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The way it was being actual value, the same as commercial and residential...

SENATOR HEFNER: That is correct.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes, okay.
