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You would have your actual dollars. You'd be dealing with real figures rather than speculative and the Appropriations Committee and every member of this body on a daily basis would be able to keep track on that basis as to what is going on. So I would urge this amendment also be adopted and I would ask the support of Senator Warner and I would also say as I suggested, I applaud him for bringing this rule change. I think it will give us additional time in the Legislature where we won't be using this thing in a political way as I think it has occurred in the past and I would also ask that you adopt this amendment so that we can continue an orderly process of processing all bills including A bills.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator. I'm going to have the Clerk read the DeCamp amendment. (DeCamp amendment appears on page 668 of the Legislative Journal.)

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp's amendment would amend Senator Warner's proposed change by striking the following sentence. (Read DeCamp amendment.)

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Mr. Clerk, and the Chair recognizes Senator Morehead.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Mr. President, members of the body, I know that sometimes rules changes, for those who have not been here, become a little dry, dull and boring, but they are very important. First of all I want to thank Senator DeCamp for supporting Senator Warner's rule change, but I now find it necessary to stand and oppose his amendment. I will tell you that it is a little bit like going through the grocery store for all of those of you who have the fine opportunity to go grocery shopping. You pick up one item at a time. Each one of them seems fairly insignificant whether it be anchovies or, if your budget allows, stuffed anchovies, but when you get to the end of the line, lo and behold, surprise, what you have spent! So I am saying that unless we are each provided with our small calculator and find that we are totaling these insignificant A bills as we travel down the path of legislative endeavor, that we indeed would be surprised when we reach the checkout counter. So contrary to Senator DeCamp's reasoning, I would say for the very same reason we should not adopt his amendment. He says that we will, in fact, take care of the jam at the end. He says additional expenses will occur if not handled as we go
