SENATOR DECAMP: He wouldn't commit himself is what I understand.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I had misperceived what I thought Senator DeCamp was saying. I thought he was saying that they had talked to the Governor's Office and they go for this idea, that they had talked to the Attorney General's Office and they go for the idea, and that the Legislature is merely facilitating what they have already decided ought to be done, but since I misunderstood that, I must assume then that the Governor has not committed himself to this, the Attorney General's Office has not been committed to this, and this is a recommendation by the Legislature which may or may not be acted upon but I still would say that rather than the Legislature requesting the initiation of a lawsuit, the request should be that the Attorney General's Office consider whether...
