

lawsuit. However, since the resolution is nonbinding, they will use their best judgment anyway, but in the present form of the resolution, I just won't vote for it.

SENATOR NICHOL PRESIDING

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator DeCamp, did you wish to close on your resolution, please.

SENATOR DECAMP: Merely to say that we have had repeated discussions with the Governor's Office and with other individuals involved in this entire picture of this money and all deposits in state institutions and I am not going into all that now. This is one idea the Banking Committee has for helping push it to a resolution. It is a request of the Attorney General. Obviously, they can't commit until they receive a request. The Banking Committee passed the resolution and I suppose we could have gone directly to the Attorney General. We just sought to bring it to the floor first and have the Legislature vote on whether they would like to also join in making the request. That is the sole purpose of the resolution.

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right, the question is the adoption of resolution number 53. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Senator Chambers asks for a record vote. You can vote at your machine, please. Have you all voted that care to? Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: (Record vote read. See page 705 of the Legislative Journal.) 36 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of the resolution, Mr. President.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The resolution, number 54, 53 has been adopted. Move on to LR 54, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, 54 offered by Senator Sieck and others, found on page 689 of the Journal. (Read.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Sieck.

SENATOR SIECK: Mr. President, members of the body, there are 17 individuals on this resolution. I feel it is a very important resolution. What the federal government wants to do is to knock out all of the conservation programs, eliminate the Soil Conservation Service down to 5,000
