

SENATOR DECAMP: His button doesn't work so he doesn't even know how to vote. I'll ask for a call of the house since they're going to have to have everybody here anyway when they do anything.

PRESIDENT: Time had expired on the vote time so the question is now, shall the house come under call? In a moment. Shall the house come under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 11 ayes, 1 nay to go under call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The House is under call and the question before the house was the motion to cease debate, vote aye or nay. You may call in your vote to the Clerk. And the house is under call.

CLERK: Senator Nichol voting yes. Senator Pappas voting yes.

PRESIDENT: Have you all voted? Have you all voted? The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 10 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The motion prevails. Debate is closed. The call of the house is raised and Senator Beutler is entitled to close.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Unicameral, we've had a lot of discussion today and a lot of the discussion has not been on point. And I'm really sorry for the partisan tones that have developed. It was not intended originally that this be partisan at all. It was intended to be the same as the trip to Washington, that is, all people concerned about the agricultural situation doing what they could to address the agricultural situation. And obviously there are two parts to the agricultural situation. There is the short-term credit situation and there's the long-term farm bill, the price support situation, the general philosophic question of what it is in the end or which direction in the end we're going on in agriculture.
