

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, this simply says the Legislature is concerned about the issue which the resolution, of course, recites, but in the portion of the resolution where it says we are telling the President in effect whether to veto or not veto, or whatever, it just says we ask him to carefully consider the legislation if it is presented to him and when it is presented to him. And I think that is a more reasonable approach and certainly nonpartisan than possibly the original proposal. I urge its adoption.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit, you are next. Senator Schmit, do you wish to speak on the DeCamp amendment?

SENATOR SCHMIT: I am just endorsing the DeCamp amendment and then I would like to speak on the bill...on the resolution.

PRESIDENT: Senator Beutler, do you wish to speak on the DeCamp amendment?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I would like to strongly urge that you reject the amendment because it makes nonsense of the whole resolution. Carefully consider, we don't want him to carefully consider. I don't want him to carefully consider. I want him to change his mind. These credit amendments are good amendments. They help the farmer.
